Ways the School of Nursing Extends Beyond the Classroom

Adjunct faculty member, Maureen Graziano, has been busy on and off campus helping run HIS Coalition for the homeless. In an effort to address both the short and long term needs of the homeless in our local community, she gathered a group of concerned community members together and started HIS Coalition for the Homeless, a grassroots, faith based 501(c)(3).

"We are completely volunteer- based and all donations go directly to help folks as needs arise." Did you know that on Long Island. It is estimated that more than 3,000 individuals on Long Island are experiencing homelessness on any given day. In recent years, there has been a significant shift in the ratio of sheltered versus unsheltered homeless, with many more experiencing street homelessness than ever before (LI Homeless, 2021).

Over the past few years, we have had the honor of working with several individuals who are experiencing homelessness through many walks of life, from young adults, to college students, to senior citizens and single moms in family shelters.

"By taking the time to engage and listen to each person's unique story, we have learned the factors that contribute to homelessness are varied and multifaceted, including, but not limited to, mental health struggles, alcohol and drug addiction, fleeing domestic violence, family strife, and/or economic instability after loss of a job."

"Generous donations from the community have helped us to provide needs-based outreach, supplying assistance with basic needs including nutritious foods, warm clothing and sleeping bags, campground site fees, bus tickets, essential auto repairs, motel stays during inclement weather, and sharing a cup of hot coffee and lending a listening ear. The homeless will always be among us, but we believe that through compassionate street outreach, coalition building, and advocacy efforts, we are one step closer to achieving our vision of a world where everyone has access to safe, warm, and dignified shelter and the opportunity to move into a future filled with hope."

What nursing program did you attend at Stony Brook University? What year did you graduate?

I graduated with an ANP, PNP in 1993, and I was also in the first graduating DNP class in 2009. I received my undergraduate BSN degree in 1976 from Villanova University.

Why did you choose to become a nurse?

My mother was a nurse and she worked as a Mobile Army Surgical Hospital nurse (MASH) during the Korean War and was always my role model. Early on, I started working in a hospital at the age of 14 as a candy striper, then moving on to a nurses aide. The profession called to me at an early age.

What made Stony Brook University School of Nursing your school of choice for your nursing education?

One of the reasons I chose Stony Brook School of Nursing (SON) was the ability to continue my education in the hospital of my employment. It was so convenient to work "upstairs" and go to school "downstairs". Having quick access to a health science library, nursing faculty, staff made the educational process so accessible.

How long have you served on the SON Alumni Board?

I have been a member of the SON Alumni Board for many years and I am currently starting my third year as SON Alumni Board President.

Why did you want to serve on the SON Alumni Board?

I always prided myself on the ability to give back and that has always carried with me throughout my life. I feel that as alumni, we have a responsibility to give back to the SON. We need to advocate for the future of the school and its students and I feel we should be proud of where we came from. Supporting the SON as a member of the board and donating money for a scholarship are some of the ways in which I have demonstrated my support over the years.

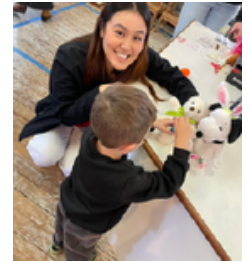

- **Stellar School Chapter Recognition** - recognizes Stony Brook's commitment to NSNA, involvement in shared governance, and promotion of professional development within SON students and faculty/staff.
- **Population and Global Health Award** - awarded to SBSNA for the use of Teddy Bear Clinics in educating the community about illness prevention, screening, and healthcare/wellness.
- **Health Policy Award** - awarded to SBSNA for commitment toward improving health policy. By partnering with Kathleen Eviza, Sigma UN Youth Representative, and Patrick Chiu, Sigma UN Liaison, SBSNA members learned more about the most pertinent health policy issues, as well as what goes into health policy development.

2024 Distinguished Alumni Award Recipient, Dr. Kellie Dionne Bryant, DNP, WHNP, CHSE, FAAN



Dr. Kellie Bryant is currently the Director of the Center for Innovation in Education Excellence at the National League for Nursing. Dr. Bryant has garnered expertise in her field with a teaching career spanning over two decades and 15 years of specialized simulation experience. Within her current role, she is responsible for providing leadership and strategic direction, focusing on developing revenue-generating initiatives that advance teaching excellence and enhance faculty skills for contemporary learners. This includes expanding the NLN faculty development program offerings with innovative teaching and learning strategies, while also enhancing online and in-person resources, and developing new simulation and technology products through collaborations with strategic partners. In addition, she also serves as a consultant for Dr. Uché Blackstock's Advancing Health Equity.

Dr. Bryant's research pursuits include leveraging simulation to enhance patient safety, prevent opioid overdoses, and create nursing pathway programs to inspire historically marginalized students to pursue a nursing career.

In leadership and service, Dr. Bryant actively engages with numerous national and international committees. She holds the vice chair position for the Society for Simulation in Healthcare's DEI committee and is a board member for the Global Network for Simulation in Healthcare. Furthermore, she is an elected board member of the International Nursing Association of Clinical Simulation Learning and is a member of the editorial board of the Clinical Simulation in Nursing journal. Lastly, she is the second vice president of the Greater NYC Black Nurses Association.

Dr. Bryant's educational journey commenced with an Associate degree in nursing from Hudson Valley Community College. She received her Bachelor's in Nursing and a Master's Degree as a Women's Health Nurse Practitioner from Stony Brook University. Lastly, she obtained her Doctorate in Nursing Education from Case Western Reserve University.

2024 Distinguished Alumni Award Recipient, Dr. Corrine Jurgens, PhD, RN, ANP, FAHA, FHFA, FAAN

Dr. Corrine Jurgens is an Associate Professor and PhD Program Director at Boston College's William F Connell School of Nursing. Prior to Boston College, she was a faculty member in the School of Nursing at Stony Brook University for 25 years. While at Stony Brook, Dr. Jurgens held several positions including the Associate Dean for Research, Program Director for the DNP program and Director of Cardiovascular Nursing Research. Her clinical experience in cardiac and critical care nursing informs her program of research.

Dr. Jurgens research focuses on biobehavioral factors underpinning symptom perception among patients with heart failure. To support judicious use of healthcare resources, the aim of her program of research is to appropriately stratify patients to self-monitoring or intensive/objective clinical oversight.

Dr. Jurgens has conducted and published several studies and given numerous presentations nationally and internationally. A key element of her research was the development of a robust measure of heart failure symptom perception that predicts clinical events. The Heart Failure Somatic Perception Scale has been translated into several languages including Spanish, French, German, Italian, Chinese, Japanese and Turkish to name a few. In October 2019, Dr. Jurgens had the honor of representing the Heart Failure Society of America at the Japanese Heart Failure Society Scientific Sessions in Hiroshima, Japan to present on multidisciplinary management of patients with heart failure.

Dr. Jurgens is an active member of several professional organizations including the American Heart Association (AHA), the Heart Failure Society of America (HFSA), and the Eastern Nursing Research Society. She served as Scientific Sessions chair representing the AHA Cardiovascular and Stroke Nursing council, chaired 2 AHA scientific statements and has been on several writing groups for performance measures and data standards. She also was on the board of directors of HFSA for 12 years and held the officer positions of secretary and treasurer. Dr. Jurgens serves on the editorial board for the Journal of Cardiovascular Nursing and the Journal of Cardiac Failure and reviews for numerous nursing and medical journals.

Dr. Jurgens earned her Bachelor of Science Degree from the University of Vermont, her Master of Science from Stony Brook University, and her PhD from the University of Massachusetts, Amherst. In addition, Dr. Jurgens was a Claire M. Fagin Postdoctoral Fellow at the University of Pennsylvania with a focus on elders with heart failure. She is a fellow of the American Heart Association, the Heart Failure Society of America, and the American Academy of Nursing.



2024 Distinguished Alumni Award Recipient,

Dr. Jeanne Martin, DNP, RN, ANP-BC

Dr. Jeanne Martin, DNP, RN, ANP-BC received her Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing from East Stroudsburg University, East Stroudsburg PA in 1988. She received a Master of Science in Adult Health Nursing from Stony Brook University in 1996 and Doctor of Nursing Practice degree also from Stony Brook University in 2016. She began her nursing career at Stony Brook University Hospital in 1988 working as a Registered Nurse and then accepted a Nurse Practitioner position at the same institution in the Department of Urology in 1997. Her primary responsibilities involve caring for Adult Urology patients admitted to Stony Brook University Hospital in all aspects of care from admission to discharge, along with coordinating care post-discharge. Dr. Martin also serves on several hospital-wide committees including institutional quality improvement, interdisciplinary care and departmental initiatives.



Dr. Martin strongly believes that nurses must remain active in professional organizations. She has been an active member of The Nurse Practitioner Association NYS and the Nurse Practitioner Association of Long Island since 1996. She also has been part of the Society of Urologic Nurses and Associates since 1998, Sigma Theta Tau International since 2004 and the American Urological Association since 2016. She has also served on the Stony Brook University School of Nursing Alumni Board of Directors since 2016 where she is currently holding the position of Immediate Past-President.

Dr. Martin has received several honors and awards during her profession career including The NPA NYS Nurse Practitioner of the Year award (2015), the American Association of Nurse Practitioner's Excellence in Advocacy for New York State (2015), the Lenora McClean Award for Excellence in Advanced Practice Nursing for Stony Brook University Hospital (2004 & 2017), the Nurse Practitioner Association Long Island's Nurse Practitioner of the Year Award (2009), and the Pura Pantojas Award for Nurse of the Year for Stony Brook University Hospital (1994). She was also inducted into her High School Hall of Fame at Commack High School as a Distinguished Alumni in 2018 and into her college Athletic Hall of Fame at East Stroudsburg University in East Stroudsburg, PA in 2019.

Dr. Martin has presented on numerous occasions on Urologic topics both locally, regionally, and nationally. She recently contributed, as lead co-author, a chapter on Genitourinary Cancers to Oncology Nursing (in press) as well as authored 3 sections on urologic topics in "Textbook for the Adult-Gerontology Acute Care Nurse Practitioner" published in 2023. She also speaks to numerous nurse practitioner students on legislative issues and professional membership. She has served as an adjunct Clinical Instructor at Stony Brook University in the Adult/Gerontology Nurse Practitioner program.

Message from Dr. Patricia Bruckenthal

This past May, Dr. Barbara Mills, the president of the School of Nursing Alumni Association, but moreover a role model and inspiration to countless nurses and nursing students retired from her distinguished career at Stony Brook University Hospital, a career which spanned over four decades.

Upon graduating from Stony Brook University School of Nursing with a Master's degree in 1993, Dr. Mills focused her nursing career specializing as a nurse practitioner in adult acute and critical care. For the past 17 years, Dr. Mills has been the Director of Stony Brook's Rapid Response Team. She was a member of the inaugural Doctor of Nursing Practice graduating class at Stony Brook in 2009. She herself was a 2015 recipient of the School of Nursing Distinguished Alumni Award. As a vital member of the Stony Brook Medicine community, Dr. Mills serves as a preceptor for today's nursing students and identifies as a "nurse's nurse."

Dr. Mills has made and continues to make significant contributions to the profession of Nursing through outstanding practice, research and community involvement. She has transformed the Rapid Response program at Stony Brook University Hospital to one that is imitated throughout the nation. She has spent 45 years in nursing and was a Clinical Assistant Professor at the Renaissance School of Medicine at Stony Brook University. Barbara will often state that she's just as passionate about her career today as she was in 1976.

Dr. Mills has often shared the story of nearly having to drop out of nursing school as a sophomore when her father passed away. It was the generosity of a scholarship that allowed her to stay in school and graduate without debt.

Nursing is the future of healthcare in this country. And the more we support each other, the better off this country and health care will be for all of us.”*
