




GEOGRAPHIC REGIONS FOR FALL 2025 ENROLLEES

Research Faculty Honors



CLARE WHITNEY

PhD, MBE, RN Assistant Professor

Assistant Professor <u>Clare Whitney, PhD, MBE, RN</u>, was selected as a 2025 Macy Faculty Scholar in early March. One of five educators nationwide to make up the distinguished class of 2025, Dr. Whitney becomes Stony Brook's first-ever Macy Faculty Scholar.

The program identifies and develops early-career nursing and medicine educators to become more effective leaders locally and nationally. Scholars have access to professional development programs, formal mentoring, educational opportunities, and Macy grantees.

Dr. Whitney's work is focused on reducing burnout and improving the well-being of healthcare professionals. She established an interdisciplinary research program that addresses pressing relational and ethical issues for the healthcare workforce.

Dr. Whitney is an affiliated faculty member in the Center for Medical Humanities, Compassionate Care, and Bioethics in the Renaissance School of Medicine at Stony Brook University.

ANN-MARGARET NAVARRA

PHD, CPNP, FAAN Associate Professor Associate Dean, Nursing Research and Innovation

Associate Dean for Nursing Research and Innovation Ann-Margaret Navarra, PHD, CPNP, FAAN, was one of 10 innovators selected for the first-ever Nursing Science Incubator for Social Determinants of Health (SDOH) Solutions (N-SISS) Fellowship at Johns Hopkins School of Nursing's Institute for Policy Solutions (IPS).

This highly competitive fellowship recognizes
Dr. Navarra's outstanding qualifications, innovative
research, and commitment to addressing healthcare
inequities in the U.S. through the lens of SDOH.

A leader in nursing science, Dr. Navarra's research focuses on HIV/AIDS, pediatrics, chronic disease, and underserved populations. In the 1990s, she was a trailblazer in advanced practice pediatric nursing, spearheading care initiatives for youth living with HIV/AIDS.

Her N-SISS research will focus on increasing viral load suppression and improving other health outcomes among Latino adolescents and young adults living with HIV.

KENNETH FAULKNER

PhD, RN, ANP, FHFSA Clinical Associate Professor Dir., Accelerated/Basic Baccalaureate Programs

Clinical Associate Professor Kenneth Faulkner, PhD, RN, ANP, FHFSA, and international colleagues published groundbreaking research addressing frailty syndrome in heart failure patients on January 21, 2025.

The paper proposes innovative strategies for integrating frailty interventions into existing heart failure care models. Emphasizing a tailored approach rooted in the nursing process, the recommendations begin with comprehensive assessments to determine individual needs. Frailty, a complex condition impacting multiple physiological systems, significantly affects outcomes.

Dr. Faulkner's work highlights the critical role of cognitive interventions in enhancing adherence to other essential therapies, such as exercise and dietary adjustments.

These interventions not only improve frailty but also demonstrate the potential to alleviate heart failure symptoms. This research represents a significant step towards optimizing care and enhancing the quality of life for patients with heart failure.

Launched by SUNY Chancellor John B. King Jr., this fellowship is part of a statewide initiative to enhance nursing education through simulation-based learning. Through this fellowship, she will contribute to the SUNY-wide Simulation Shared Resource Library, advancing healthcare education in New York.

Dr. Giugliano founded the School Intervention and Reentry Program at Stony Brook Children's Hospital, helping young patients transition back to school.

The joint Jonas Nursing and Flynn

Foundation scholarship program recognizes and supports doctoral nursing students seeking to improve healthcare for cancer patients. Jonas-Flynn scholarships have awarded financial support of \$550,000 to date.

Professor Cavanaugh is the <u>adult-gerontology acute care nurse practitioner</u> program director and a clinical instructor of graduate studies and advanced practice nursing at the Stony Brook University School of Nursing. Additionally, she works as an adult gerontological acute care nurse practitioner at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center and is pursuing a <u>DNP degree</u> in the care of populations track at Quinnipiac University.

SBU GRADUATES FIRST LISVH SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM COHORT

The Long Island State Veterans Home (LISVH)
Nursing Scholarship Program's <u>first-ever cohort</u>
<u>graduated</u> from the Stony Brook University
School of Nursing in May.

Bryanna Foster, Keith Krupa, Fuxia Ma, Krista Romano, and Kristi Rubino-Rosales earned Bachelor of Science degrees through Stony Brook's Registered Nurse Baccalaureate Program (RNBP) while working full- or part-time at the LISVH.

The Nursing Scholarship Program recruits eligible Suffolk County Community College (SCCC) graduates to work at the LISVH while enrolled in the RNBP at no additional cost to the student.

Those enrolled agree to a three-year contract with LISVH, the first two of which coincide with their time in the RNBP. The Class of 2025 will spend at least one year post-graduation working as registered professional nurses.

STONY BROOK NAMED SUNY REGIONAL NURSING SIMULATION CENTER

The Stony Brook University School of Nursing has been selected as a State University of New York (SUNY) Regional Nursing Simulation Center, one of only three in New York State. Governor Kathy Hochul announced the selected centers in May, which will involve an overall \$62 million investment to bolster nursing training at various levels throughout the state.

Stony Brook will receive \$10 million from SUNY, with matching university funds of \$10.5 million. The total of \$20.5 million will be used to create a new simulation center at Stony Brook, which will incorporate the latest simulation technologies to train more nursing students and enhance the overall nursing education experience.

The selected campuses include the University of Buffalo, named the SUNY System-Wide Nursing Simulation Center of Excellence, and SUNY Canton and Stony Brook as the regional centers. Each center will provide high-quality, hands-on training for some of the most needed clinical practice areas in health care, such as labor and delivery, high acuity cases, and community health.

According to the Governor's office, with their investments, each campus has committed to significant prelicensure nursing program enrollment growth, leveraging the legislation Governor Hochul signed in May of 2023, permitting nursing students to complete up to one-third of their clinical training through high-quality simulation experiences.

The new regional nursing simulation center at Stony Brook will support a 19 percent increase in prelicensure (baccalaureate) nursing enrollment in the first year post-project completion. There is a projected 27 percent increase over the next five years.

According to the plan, Stony Brook will significantly expand its simulation space footprint to enhance in-person nursing education. The center will leverage advanced simulcast software technology to provide remote learning opportunities across Long Island.

KRISTAN PROBECK NAMED NPALI NURSE PRACTITIONER OF THE YEAR

School of Nursing double alumna Kristan Probeck, MS, RN, BC-CV, ANP-C, was named <u>Nurse Practitioner</u> (NP) of the Year for Region 7 by the Nurse Practitioner Association of Long Island (NPALI) in July.

An expert in her field, Ms. Probeck helped develop the Pulmonary Embolism Response Team at Stony Brook. She's spoken about VTE standards and research at national conferences, presented award-winning posters at vascular conferences, and authored peer-reviewed journal articles.

Ms. Probeck joined Stony Brook Surgery's vascular division in 2013 as a venous thromboembolism (VTE) nurse practitioner. She began her career as a certified nursing assistant before obtaining her registered nurse credentials in 2003.
